What's Up, Watson!



Great news!!! The work on the structural repairs for Watson has begun. It's being jacked up very slowly. Two engineering students from the University of New Hampshire are working on it with Charlie Goodspeed.

Here's an update from Charlie himself:

"Students and I are discovering the outstanding engineering and construction quality built into Watson Academy more than 130 years ago. It is the undesirable subsurface conditions that have plagued the Academy for years. Ledge, silty subsurface, and runoff when combined are simply not good to support a foundation. restricts water penetration resulting in fully saturated silty material supporting the building. Over the years this material allowed columns to settle producing cracks in numerous structural members. Our goal is to stabilize the building by installing a column/s that penetrates the silty materials to bear directing on the underlying ledge. We hope to complete the work by fall."

Outside Watering Ban in Epping

There is a mandatory outside watering ban in effect in Epping. Epping town wells are currently at critically low levels and water conservation is very important. The Town is working hard to bring two new wells online, but that process will not be complete before next spring.

2015 Town Re-Evaluation

2015 is the Town-wide re-evaluation for the Town of Epping. Please expect to see Assessing personnel from both Vision Appraisal and Municipal Resources visiting properties and collecting physical data. These visits may include a request to tour the inside of your property and measure the exterior improvements. The Assessing agents will have photo identification on them. If you have any questions, please call the Town Hall at 679-5441 or the Police Department at 679-5834.

East West Express

Flight Line transported over 400 passengers last month (May 2015). Most of the traffic was between Manchester-Boston Regional Airport and Epping NH, but many passengers traveled between Epping and Portsmouth as well as Epping and Downtown Manchester. This is encouraging since the goal of the East West Express service is to build volume by providing a service that meets the needs of many different types of travelers. By offering a service that caters to the airport traffic, as well as the commuter and/or day tripper, the service has a better chance of building volume which in turn provides the revenue that keeps the service in operation.

Flight Line representatives recently met with the director of the Manchester-Boston Regional Airport and the director of transportation at the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this meeting was to vet options to boost passenger loads on the East West Express and also identify possible links to UNH's Wildcat Transit system. Epping Historical Society

Summer is here! We are very busy at the society at this time. Many visitors stop in to visit when they are in town. I am always amazed at how many folks have family roots right here in Epping not only people from other states, but many from all over New Hampshire. In the early days, many Epping families maintained two homes, one here in Epping, and another home where they operated a business. They may have owned a manufacturing business in the North, or owned and operated a lumber business. It was more convenient for the families to maintain two homes then to travel back and forth. So there are Epping families who have family roots in other areas of the state.

We have been working on our "Historic Cookbook" for the last few weeks. Thank all of you for your contribution of your favorite recipes. The cookbook is at the publisher's, and should be available by late summer. This is a fundraiser for the Epping Historical Society. We need new windows and a new roof for the attached building. We had a bit of ice damage (along with the rest of the town) this past winter. We will be selling the books for \$10.00. The books will be available at the Society, or you can call to purchase the books. I wish to thank our chairman and all the volunteers that spent many hours putting the cookbook together. Thank you all!!

The Town of Epping has started work on the Sally Plumer Park, I am sure you have noticed that the big tree was removed. The tree was very overgrown, and needed to be replaced. The fence has been removed, as well as the bricks. A new walkway is installed and it is beautiful! In the near future veteran memorial bricks will be installed in front of the monument, and granite posts will surround the park. This will be an ongoing project, improving our downtown appearance.

In June, we had a program at the Society: "Researching Your Home Online." Dana Zulager from Raymond, presented the program. Although we had a very small audience, everyone was very enthusiastic to get started on their own research.

We have information available at the society for websites and tools for researching.

Warnings Out

Between 1657 and 1817, there were laws about settling in a town. If a family decided to move to a new town, the family was given a "Warning Out" when they arrived at a new place. This was an official document, signed and sealed by the Townsmen. At that time, many new towns were established, and the "Townsmen" or Selectmen of these towns decided if a family was allowed to become an inhabitant of said town. When new families came to town, they had to have a means of support, because the towns could not support families that were poor and looking for a place to live. The newcomers had to declare what town they came from, in case they fell on harder times, and became town supported. If that happened, they were removed to their former town, for that town to support the family. On the official warrants, the family is named in this order: husband, wife, and children by age and name, so there was no mistaking who they were. Many people ignored the "warning out," bought land, established a home or business and led very productive lives. After three years they could apply to the Selectmen to become an inhabitant of that town. The laws of each town were very different; some towns allowed families to stay after a few months, some towns never allowed in new inhabitants.

At the Epping Historical Society, we have several official "Warnings Out," some from Epping, sending the family back to Newmarket, and even one from Newmarket, sending a family back home to Epping.

I know this sounds cruel and unfeeling, but for the times it was acceptable. Life was harsh, especially for those who were poor. In some cases, even those with property were "Warned Out," just in case they ended up poor. If the head of the family should die, and he left a widow and children, what were they to do? Wives did not work outside the home, so they did not have any way to support themselves or their children. In many cases, the family was split up, children "given" away, wives going into service (more like servitude) just to survive. The town did not want to be responsible for their support, so they removed the family to whence they came.

TALES FROM EPPING'S PAST Remembering Lyman W. Cate

Lest We Forget

Back in the 1860's, a man by the name of Lyman Cate and his family lived here in Epping on Spring Street. This street, as so many were back then, was probably little more than a dirt road. It was located about a half mile from "Epping Corner" which is our downtown area today.

Mr. Cate's wife, affectionately called "Lizzie," was a popular and talented church organist. And Mr. Cate, who was known around town as "Bigfoot Cate" (possibly a clue to his size), was a notable jack of many trades. He was a member of the Epping police force, a shoemaker and a good cook who, with his handy horse and cart, provided food and refreshments not only to the crowds attending the Hedding Camp Ground meetings, but at other events in Epping and elsewhere as well. For years Mr. Cate was also a lamplighter who each evening made his rounds along Epping Corner to fill and light the oil street lamps along the way. And at one time he had men blasting ledge all around his place with dynamite hoping to discover silver and other valuable minerals. We're not sure how long this went on, but the explosions from this venture must not only have bothered Lizzie and the neighbors no end, but must have been heard all over town and beyond.

But most notably, Lyman Cate had returned to Epping as a Civil War veteran. He served with the legendary 8th New Hampshire Volunteer Infantry battle at Regiment at the Port Louisiana where he was wounded. This regiment lost a total of 258 men at Port Hudson, the most of any Union regiment in that hot and diseaseridden setting so far from home.

Mr. Cate died here in Epping in 1903 and, no doubt with full military honors, the old soldier was laid to rest in the Central Cemetery, not too far from his old home place. To further honor him, Spring Street was renamed Cate Street by this grateful town and it remains Cate Street to this day.

Lyman Cate is just one of the many war veterans at rest in Epping. Their stones have been carefully marked with the flag of our country and Taps is played over them each year.

And so may it always be. Lest we forget.



Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Firefly

Summer's here again, and love is in the air. Ah, l'amour! Depending on where you live, maybe lots of love. Love that comes and goes in a flash. Love that has its own rhythm and sometimes is deceptively alluring. Love we can't help but watch, magical yet painfully short-lived.

The firefly, or lightning bug, is more properly called a beetle. It has leathery forewing covers that conceal softer wings used for flying. Unlike other beetles, though, fireflies are fairly soft (in other words, easily squished by curious children). All fireflies have a unique shield-like covering, the pronotom, over their heads. Over 2000 species

occur in moist tropical and temperate areas. Most firefly larvae eat worms or snails. Most adults do not appear to eat.

Unlike lightbulbs, fireflies do not get warm when they glow. The light is caused by a biochemical reaction. This reaction occurs in eggs, larvae, and adults. Adults use the light to seek sexual partners. Larvae seem to use the light to warn predators of their foul taste and eggs flash the light when they are disturbed. Each firefly species in a particular area has a unique signal. This ensures that the fireflies find the right partner. One signal might be to flash for one second then rest for two seconds. Another signal might be to form a "j" shape while flashing for three seconds. Males usually signal while flying, but females usually signal from a perch, such as a blade of grass or a twig. Females of some species also can imitate another species' signal. They mimic the signal until some unwitting male approaches. Instead of mating, the female will attack and eat the male. Nobody said firefly love was always pretty.

As is true with many insect populations, firefly numbers are dwindling globally. Loss of suitable habitat is certainly a cause, but bright lights, pesticides, and fertilizers also seem to interfere with natural firefly behavior and physiology. If your family wants to enjoy nature's little light show, turn the lights down, avoid pesticides on your lawn and garden, keep fertilizer use to a minimum, and don't over-mow the lawn (fireflies hide in the grass during the day).

Enough Is Enough, or Is It? The Lamprey River Instream Flow Management Plan

With all the snow last winter, one would think that we would have had a very wet spring. That turned out not to be the case; we had a really dry spring. On the positive side, the dry spring did not deliver any floods. The downside, though, is that we are heading into summer on the dry side.

The Lamprey River is one of two rivers in New Hampshire that has a pilot "instream flow management plan." The goal of this plan is to create conditions that maintain the natural variability of flows (not strictly volume) to meet the basic survival needs of aquatic organisms. This sounds easy enough on the surface, but achieving that goal is extremely complex. In fact, the plan took more than twenty years to be finalized. The early work involved figuring out the basic needs of aquatic organisms and then determining what flow conditions were natural and when flows should be considered to be outside that range. The final stage was establishing how to supplement flow when necessary. Managing the flow of water in the Lamprey occurs primarily through controlling the amount of water that humans take from the river and controlling the amount of water released by dams.

For all the work that went into the plan, active management occurs only during low flows. The state carefully monitors both rainfall and the rate of flow in the river. Activation of instream water management is affected by how much (or more correctly, how little) water is flowing combined with the duration of different kinds of flow: allowable, persistent, and catastrophic. If flows are determined to be low enough to trigger management, the plan includes components for municipal water conservation, limiting water withdrawals, and dam management.

What does all this mean? Do people along the river have to do anything or expect noticeable changes? The short answer is...not really. If we have a long stretch of dry weather and flows in the Lamprey fall below a critical rate, the NH Dam Bureau will release a 48 hour pulse of water from Pawtuckaway Lake to the Lamprey, resulting in a lowering of the lake by about one half inch. This pulse mimics a two-day rain event and provides temporary relief to fish hiding in natural refuges in the river, but it will not be enough to enhance flows for recreational purposes. Once a pulse is released, the clock is reset. During low flows and persistent dry weather, the Town of Durham/UNH Water System is required to stop taking Lamprey River water and switch to another water source. (This happens almost every year in late summer.) Towns might also need to activate water conservation measures, such as limiting outside water use.

The Lamprey River Instream Flow Management Plan was adopted in August 2013. By statute, the state legislature will review the plan in late 2015. Depending on this review, the instream flow management plan created for the Lamprey and the lessons learned along the way could well serve as a model for other rivers in New Hampshire.
