Epping Historical Society

It looks like we went from winter to rainy season (a new season) to summer! We can finally work in our gardens without digging in mud.

We are in our busy season and visitors come from all over. Last week I was researching Jack Sharkey for a story when my phone rang. Lo and behold, on the line was a cousin of Jack Sharkey! Was that just a coincidence? Maybe..... A recent visitor was the grandson of Benjamin Woods; he was excited to see all the information we have on the Woods family. He returned home a happy man and he will keep in touch with us, even sending us additional material on the Woods family.

We do a lot of genealogy work at the Society, and at the present time we have over 100 families researched and all of their information is in 3 ring binders. Whenever we find any picture, document, etc., pertaining to the family, it is included in the binder. Some of our old families not only have a binder, but also have an archival box with additional documents. If you suspect your family may have a family binder, come in and check it out.

One of our projects is bricks for our walkway. We now have a new supplier, Bill Hopkinton, who lives and works in Raymond. He recently dropped off three new bricks and he does a wonderful job. We supplied the bricks that came from the old Rundlett building on the corner, (now Allstate) and he engraved them. The cost for a brick is \$50.00, which includes 14 letters and spaces per line with three lines allowed. What a wonderful way to honor our loved ones.

One of our volunteers is creating a tri-fold brochure for the Historical Society. It would be so nice to have a brochure to share with locals as well as visitors. Suzanne will have it ready soon, stay tuned for availability.

We are always looking for family photos to add to our collections. We are happy to make copies, returning the originals to you if you want to keep them in the family. If you are cleaning out a loved one's home, and come across pictures or documents you do not want, give us a call, we may be able to help identify people and places for you.

We are still on the lookout for a picture of the old A&P building where we are located. The only picture we have is an old newspaper photo, very grainy. Perhaps someone in your family has a better photo we can use for our new brochure.

Raymond Guerrin

Epping, October 12, 1942. "If the Army would accept me, I'll wager that I could successfully operate a tank." These are the words of Raymond E. Guerrin, a 39 year old legless man of this town, who does not regard himself handicapped at all. Although he was left with only the stubs of both legs above the knees, after his last operation a few months ago, Ray just would not become downhearted or discouraged. "I have plenty to live for" he asserted, a sturdy pair of hands, a home and the finest wife one could ask for. What more could a man want?

Ray Guerrin does practically all of the housework while his wife is employed in the local

shoe factory. He finds time to enjoy many other activities, including cooking, canning, floor scrubbing and all of the ironing. Ray also had many gardens, tending them on his "short legs." He used to do all the washing, but after he lost his second leg, that was no longer possible. He also raises rabbits, which he uses for meat; he says they resemble the taste of chicken. (Any takers?)

When he is not otherwise busy, Guerrin rides about town in his specially designed wheel chair. The chair has a sprocket chain drive, which he operates with his arms. His friends in Epping made the chair and presented it to him so he could get around better. Now that he can get around better, he recently made a trip to the Memorial Hospital in Brentwood, to visit old friends. It was three miles from his home to the hospital, and he made it in 80 minutes. He also traveled to the Rochester Fair. He was put aboard the baggage car of the train in his chair and let off at the Rochester station. That was all the help he needed.

Since he returned from the hospital last June, he has erected a small building to house his street chair. He is remarkable in ascending and descending the stairs and thinks nothing of carrying a gallon of oil up to the second floor where he lives. He lives at the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Emma Lambert. Guerrin is the victim of a rare disease which affects his veins. Medical science has as of yet, to determine the cause of this rare disease. He underwent his first operation in 1929 for the removal of a toe, and has been in hospitals frequently since, but his indomitable courage has always won out and he has come home smiling.

He is one of 17 children born to the late Joseph and Emma (Coriveau) Guerrin of Epping. Only one brother and four sisters remain, although none have suffered with the same disease. Guerrin worked for two years after losing his first leg and then decided to take over household duties from his wife. He is married to Corrianna St. Laurent of Epping. The couple has no children, to their dismay. They work well together, last year they put up 250 quarts of canned goods, and are well on their way to surpass that amount this year. Ray loved the Boston Red Sox, and the thrill of his life was when his cousin took him to a game, and, Ted Williams signed a baseball for him!

Ray has a wheelchair for indoor use, and also a pair of leather "buckets" to attach to his stubs to aid in getting around easier, although he does not often use them around the house. He was a

communicant of St. Joseph Church, and is buried in the St. Joseph Cemetery in Epping.

Nature Talks

Tilton Bridge Conservation Area

Your Conservation Commission has been busy this spring. The Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee awarded us a grant to upgrade the Tilton Bridge Conservation Area where Route 87 crosses the Lamprey River.

Kevin Martin, boat builder and big tree expert, built the frame for the new Canoe Access sign (see the picture shown in the Signs of Summer article under the Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee section) and replaced missing or degraded trail signposts. Joel Harris cleared the trail and as this article was written began work on three bridges to be placed soon, allowing access to all of the trail during the summer and fall seasons. We are also grateful for the support of Dave Reinhold and the Epping Department of Public Works. Dave cut down high branches interfering with the kiosk and put a new roof on that kiosk as well.

As you will see when you visit the site, the Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee and Epping Conservation Commission have indeed developed a successful partnership. So much so, that the Commission is investigating the possibility of applying for another grant to improve the canoe launch ramp.


Photo Contest

Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee Signs of Summer on Route 87

Good things are happening in Epping! The Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee is pleased to have partnered with the Epping Conservation Commission to add some much needed signage to the Tilton Conservation Area, where Route 87 crosses the Lamprey River.



The kiosk panel above is new, replacing an older version that was damaged by several floods and subsequent attempts to clean it. The new kiosk sign includes a map and site descriptors for the flood plain trail. Formerly, a separate brochure was needed to understand what the trail markers were showing. Keeping the brochure box full of brochures (and free of trash or mice nests) was always challenging. Visitors now can take a photo of the site descriptors with their smart phones and have the information at hand as they explore the trail.

Trails and Tribulations

One of the on-going principles of the Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee is to enjoy the outdoors while protecting the resources that make the river and surrounding area enjoyable. When few people visit an area, fewer problems tend to arise. When more people visit, even with good intentions, more problems tend to arise. As you head outside this

summer, please do your part to keep nature natural.

Most trails along the Lamprey River are geared for short trips on conservation land, so please be a respectful guest. The following "Leave no trace" principles will make everyone's trip to the great outdoors great (adapted from REI Expert Advice, for day hikes):

- I. Plan ahead and prepare:
- a. Know the regulations and special concerns for the area you'll visit.
 - b. Schedule your trip to avoid times of high use.
- c. Visit in small groups when possible. Use a map and compass to eliminate the use of marking paint, rock cairns or flagging.
- 2. Travel and camp on durable surfaces:
- a. Concentrate use on existing trails. Walk single file in the middle of the trail, even when it's wet or muddy.
- 3. Dispose of waste properly:
 - a. Pack it in, pack it out.
- b. Always bag and remove dog waste. Do not leave bags along trails.
- c. Deposit solid human waste in a hole dug 6 to 8 inches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and trails. Cover and disguise the hole when finished.
- 4. Leave what you find:
- a. The adage "take only pictures, leave only footprints" still holds, although leaving fewer footprints is even better.
- b. Preserve the past: Examine (but do not touch) cultural or historic structures and artifacts.
- c. Leave rocks, plants and other natural objects as you find them.
- d. Avoid introducing or transporting non-native species: Clean boot soles, kayak hulls and bike tires off between trips.
- 5. Minimize campfire impacts (be careful with fire).
- 6. Respect wildlife:
- a. Observe wild animals from a distance. Do not follow or approach.
 - b. Never feed wild animals.
- c. Control pets at all times, or leave them at home.
- 7. Be considerate of other visitors:
- a. Cyclists yield to hikers, hikers yield to horses, downhill hikers yield to uphill hikers.
- b. Let nature's sounds prevail. Avoid loud voices and noises.
 - c. Manage your pet.

Champion of Land Protection

The health and integrity of a river is determined by more than what happens within its riverbanks. Rivers are defined and protected by the land along the river, but also by the land that surrounds small headwater streams, wetlands, and groundwater recharge areas. Protecting the best and/or most sensitive land helps to protect the water and the overall environment that relies on that water.

As of May 2019, the Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee has invested more than \$5.04 million to permanently protect 3719 acres along the river. This has involved dedicated hours of research and negotiations with landowners and other funding partners. Laurel Cox, former land protection administrator, embodies that dedication.

The following is an excerpt from the Twenty
Years of Progress Report (2017) that Laurel wrote:

Over the ten years I have actively worked in land protection, the dominant theme of the process has been partnership. Some projects are relatively simple, such as the donation of a conservation easement or property by a single generous landowner to a single land trust organization. There can also be the complexity of a single project that encompasses multiple properties, landowners, land trusts, state agencies, and all the accompanying transaction personnel (banks, lawyers, surveyors, and appraisers).

The most important partnership in land protection work is with the landowner. It is a daunting task for a farmer or forester to commit to a permanent legal restriction over family land. For some people, a conservation easement can be a

logical decision for a life spent in active environmental conservation. For other projects, the decision is much more difficult: are the owners ready to trust the legal system, town, state, or federal government to understand how to wisely manage the farm to which they have devoted their lives? Positive, trustworthy relationships are important at every stage. The bottom line for the success of these projects is that all the entities involved are working cooperatively toward the common goal of protecting the forests, fields, and rivers of our neighborhood for the long-term benefit of our future generations. I am proud to have played a role in helping LRAC with 21 projects that protected almost 1000 acres.

Summer safety

Summer is finally here and it's a great time to enjoy the outdoors. Many of you work outside and Vitamin D can be a big perk but also a danger in the sweltering sun. Always hydrate with water. If you drink any type of sports drinks, it is best to cut the drink in half with water since there is a lot of sodium and sugar. Take breaks as necessary. Heat exhaustion can lead to heat stroke if severe enough. If you employ people, please make sure to have a water jug or cooler for your employees and monitor them as well as the weather. Heat exhaustion can start with muscle cramping to nausea and feeling ill to vomiting unconsciousness. Always move to a shaded area or air conditioned vehicle and drink lots of fluids. If symptoms are worst, call 911. Sunscreen is also recommended so you don't get sunburn or sun poisoning.

Cookouts are a great way to celebrate the summer with family and friends, Make sure you grill away from your house or garage, never grill or use a hibachi on a deck. It is against the law to have a grill on a deck in an apartment or multi-family complex. (NFPA Uniform Fire Code 1, 2009 adopted by the State of NH). Use approved propane gas tanks and shut them off after the grill cools down.

Be careful when using fireworks and make sure that you and your family enjoy them from a distance. Never play with fireworks inside a building or structure and be aware of any local, state and federal laws. Yes, Town of Epping allows people to buy and use fireworks.

Pool and water Safety

Summer time is a great time to enjoy the outdoors with family and friends. A favorite of mine is going to a local beach or to my family camp in Ossipee by the lake. Always watch young children and other people, as the water is nice but things can change at a moment's notice. Teach your kids to swim, get them swimming lessons. I unfortunately had to learn on my own and wish my parents had sent me (and my brother) for lessons. Use approved types of personal floatation devices

(PFD's) for you and your kids. I also recommend them while boating. Most drownings could have been prevented if the person wore a PFD. Keep an eye out and call 911 if you suspect someone is in distress or notify a lifeguard if there's one on site.

Safety in places of Assembly

Whether you're at church, a concert venue, the movies, a hotel or at the local grocery store, always be aware of all the exits in the building in the event of an emergency. Human nature is to go out the same way people come in. Most places have a minimum of 2 exits for building and fire codes. These days it's good to know, not only for fires but for other events, active shooter and other incidents. Unfortunately we now live in a time where we have to think of the unthinkable to survive. We always train and prepare, hoping it never happens here. But it could! If you're with your family, communicate a plan and have a meeting point, the same as if you're home and a fire occurs. Always stay calm and move safely to the nearest exit.

Department operations: Water supply,

Towns and cities have many ways to get water to a fire. Some cities and towns have hydrants or combinations of hydrants, dry hydrants, cisterns and tanker trucks. Epping has a combination of all of these due to the layout of the town. Epping does have hydrants in about a third of the town. There several dry hydrants that have been established. With many ponds that were established from the brickyards and farms of yesteryear, Epping does have a small advantage in parts (not all) of the town. The town has been working with an engineer to start adding more dry hydrants in the area. What does dry mean? The pipe is dry from the connection to the pond. Cisterns are a new way to establish a water supply in a development. Cisterns can vary in size and be placed almost anywhere, a dry hydrant is a body of water that has to be measured. Most cisterns also don't require the hoops and paperwork from Dept. of Environmental Services. All have a cost and pros and cons. It does cost more money for a cistern but a cistern is cheaper that a tanker truck. All have to be maintained whether it is a truck, dry pond, hydrant, etc. A cistern is like having 10 or so tanker trucks in one spot throughout the town. (Judging on a 30,000 gallon cistern). Some parts of the town have little to no water supply and we have had to go for miles to truck water to the scene of a fire. A cistern would establish a local and closer water supply. I have sent an ordinance to the planning

board to establish better water supply for the town with a public meeting on **July 11**th. Epping does have a tanker truck with 3000 gallons. This is Engine 3 out of central station and is the second truck to respond to a fire or the mutual aid piece. Bottom line is water and personnel are the main things that put out fires.

Burn permits are required and must be obtained in order to burn brush or have a camp and or cooking fire. You may get them online at www.nhdfl.org, or stop by the fire station during the day, 7 days a week from 6 am to 6 pm. Permits Will Not be issued when fire danger is class 3 or above. For Daily Fire Danger and an explanation of the different danger levels, please follow the link www.nhdfl.org/fire-control-and-law-enforcement/daily-fire-danger.aspx.

Youth Programs
Before & After School Programs

We provide a safe, nurturing place for children to attend quality programming beyond the schools' hours of operation. We strive to help youth reach their full potential by allowing them to explore their physical, social and intellectual interests in a safe and fun setting. The culture of our programs emphasizes quality relationships and a healthy respect for individuality. We provide enough structure to keep everyone safe, but we also offer an open atmosphere that allows children to explore their interests in groups or on their own.

The Before School Program operates on normal school days at the Epping Elementary School gym in the mornings for youth in grades K-5. The program opens at 6:45 am and runs until students leave for their classrooms at 8:20 am! Kindergarteners are escorted by staff. At the program the youth are able to finish homework, work on arts and crafts projects and play games in the gym. The youth are able to eat breakfast with the school breakfast program.

The After School Program starts at the EES Library to gather, then they head outside to the EES playgrounds during good weather days or walk down to Watson Academy for snack 3:15-4:15 pm, during cold or bad weather days. The program then runs organized games and activities from 4:15 to 5:45 pm at Watson Academy and on scheduled days, uses the gym for PE related programming. The program operates from school dismissal until 5:45 pm. Children are grouped by grades.

If your child would like to participate in the school offered programs after school or extra work with a teacher, we do have staff available to pick up the kids at the designated school dismissal areas at the close of these programs. We ask that parents notify us, if their child will be attending one of the school programs and if they will be picking them up from these programs so we can coordinate the pick up schedule daily.

We offer No School Day, Parent/ Teacher Workshop and Vacation Week full day programs, which will have their own registration forms! Please check one month in advance of any No School Days on the school calendar or call us at 679-3006, if you have questions.
