When East West Express started serving the communities between Portsmouth, Epping and Manchester, it was projected that the majority of passengers using the service would travel between Portsmouth and Manchester-Boston Regional Airport. Surprisingly, after 3 months in business, half of the total passengers using the service are traveling from Epping's convenient Park & Ride stop off of route 101 / Exit 7.

East West Express thanks this publication, <u>Speak Up Epping</u>, for helping to spread the word to launch this new route to local residents and businesses! "We are excited that the Epping scheduled stop has been so popular and is now being utilized with more people taking advantage of this affordable option," said Jamie Dowd, President.

This express service was created in response to local demand along the Route 101 corridor, so East West Express wants residents to know that this is not "our baby," it is for those who live along the corridor or visit this region for business and pleasure. The future survival of the service depends directly on how many passengers use the service, so the company is depending on passengers to continue sharing the news with friends and neighbors to increase ridership.

Hourly airport service to Manchester airport is just \$9, and shuttles also sweep through the Portsmouth Transportation Center for \$10 every hour, and to downtown Manchester (Canal Street) every two hours. TALES FROM EPPING'S PAST From Boston to Epping The Cocoanut Grove Fire

In 1942, the worst building fire with the greatest loss of life in New England history occurred in Boston at the popular Cocoanut Grove nightclub. Two couples from Epping planned to go and celebrate there that night after the Thanksgiving weekend football game at Fenway Park. However, when their favorite team, Boston College, lost the game, one couple decided to just call it a day and head back to Epping instead of to the nightclub. The other couple went on to the Cocoanut Grove thev never returned instead and home. Heartbroken families and our little town were left in shock.

We lost Ruth Morris, a beloved daughter from an old Epping family, and her husband, Paul Carbone. The second couple was her old friend Dorothy Dean Swanson, also from Epping, and her husband, boxing champion, Jack Sharkey. Many years later Jack tearfully described how he and Dorothy first learned of the dreadful news when they opened their newspaper the next morning.

The nightclub had been jammed with over a

thousand people. Wartime servicemen and their sweethearts, football fans, and many others were crowded into a space rated for a maximum of 460 persons. It was said the fire started in a dim downstairs lounge when a busboy lit a match to find a light socket. The flammable decorations and furniture quickly caught fire and it spread to the main level where cloth draperies and more decorations covered the exit signs. Further, the exit doors were designed to only open inward and locked to keep out gatecrashers. Almost 500 lives were lost in Boston that night. This awful event resulted in many more strictly enforced fire regulations for public buildings that protect us today.

Except for some neighbors and history fans, few folks know just where in Boston the Cocoanut Grove nightclub was located. Last November marked the 71st anniversary of the fire and the small block where the club once stood was officially named Cocoanut Grove Lane and dedicated to the memory and honor of all those whose lives were forever changed there so long ago.

This column is dedicated to the memory of Epping's lovely Ruth Morris Carbone, her husband Paul, and their families.

With this issue, we are seeing the beginnings of SPRING! It has been a very long winter, so spring is welcome. White is no longer my favorite color, I love green!!

The time has come for the Epping Historical Society to begin looking for the next recipient of the Boston Post Cane. The cane is presented to the Town's oldest resident. The cane was last presented in the summer of 2011. There are guidelines for anyone wishing to receive the Boston Post Cane

- 1. Recipient must be an Epping resident for at least 40 years, and still live here.
 - 2. Recipient must be willing to accept the honor.
- 3. If the recipient leaves town, or enters a nursing home, the cane is to be returned to the Epping Historical Society.

We have completed updating our bathroom and it is now more accessible for everyone. It is amazing what a new floor, new handicap accessible fixtures and paint can do to spruce up a room. Thank you to everyone who supported our fundraising events so we could make this possible.

Do you know the history of our building? This building was the former home of the great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company. James F. Brown, Sr. & James F. Brown, Jr., along with Leslie Tasker built the building in 1924 for the A&P Company. If you have been in our building, you will notice it has only a front window, and the room is long and skinny, a typical A&P store. The manager lived upstairs, as part of his salary. Alfred Cloutier was the first manager, then Albion Pendergrace, and later Oscar Dionne. Many of our older Epping residents worked there when they were kids. The A&P sold groceries, small hardware, chicken feed, and also the chickens! They also sold tobacco products. I can remember the shelf where Prince Albert was located. Brown sold the building in 1959 to Peter Mouflouse after the closing of the store. John and Minnie Warren purchased the building in 1977 for the purpose of donating it to the Epping Historical Society. The only picture we have of the building when it was the A&P is a copy of a newspaper article and it's not a very good picture. So, I am asking if anyone here in Epping has a snapshot of the old A&P, and if you are willing to let us make a copy of your picture. Not only is the building historical, but we house many historical documents detailing the History of Epping.

We are open every Monday from 8:00 to12:00 or when the flag is flying. Please call 679-2944 for an appointment. We are available most days.

Lamprey River Advisory Committee Spring into Vernal Pools

Spring will soon be in the air, the water, and in the soil. It will also be in the drive of many animals and plants to continue their kind. With so much happening in spring, tracking all the activity can be difficult, but it is well worth the effort.

One cool place to explore the wonders of spring is among the many vernal pools that dot our landscape. "Vernal" comes from a Latin word for spring. These temporary pools are wet only seasonally and can disappear from view altogether by mid-summer. Some vernal pools are quite deep, but others are shallow. In the northeast, most vernal pools occur in the forest or along the flood plain of rivers.

Most wetlands are defined by the presence of wet (hydric) soils and special plants that thrive in wetlands. In contrast, vernal pools lack these soils and plants. They are defined largely by the *presence* of certain animals that breed only in these temporary pools and by the *absence* of fish.


Amphibians which breed only in vernal pools include wood frogs, spotted salamanders, blue spotted salamanders, marbled salamanders, and Jefferson salamanders. These animals use the pool for breeding, but otherwise spend most of their time in the surrounding area. The adults pair and mate shortly after ice-out, then the females lay their gelatinous egg masses in the pools, often attaching them to sticks. Another animal that breeds and lives only in vernal pools is the tiny fairy shrimp. In dry years, these animals endure by forming hard cysts among the leaf litter that will line the vernal pool in wet years.

Because vernal pools are temporary and often go unnoticed by large-scale survey methods, they are very susceptible to damage or destruction caused by human activity such as development. If they are filled or built on, they cease to be valuable habitats. Similarly, if the area around a vernal pool is developed, the adults may be lost. Endangered Blanding's turtles and threatened spotted and wood turtles rely on vernal pools as important feeding stopovers.

Another problem happens when vernal pools are separated from other vernal pools or important habitat by habitat fragmentation. Fragmentation occurs when a large area of land becomes a patchwork of houses, businesses, roads, etc., even though some smaller natural areas are still present. Protecting one isolated vernal pool and the surrounding area is helpful for a few years, but the populations of amphibians eventually become impaired by a lack of genetic diversity. Small populations cannot survive well in isolation. Protecting an area with a group of vernal pools that can remain in a natural state will bring more and greater benefits to the creatures of vernal pools and to the entire ecosystem.

Vernal pools are important to the proper functioning of our landscape and they are fascinating places to visit. If you find a vernal pool, take the opportunity to look for egg masses and the critters that made them. As always, please tread lightly and handle with care, leaving no trace of your visit.

New! Lamprey River Junior Rangers Program



At important parks and historic sites, rangers help visitors appreciate and protect the resources of the site. The Lamprey River is in the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System, but it is not a state park or national park. It does not have paid rangers to work with the public. That's where Junior Rangers can help.

The Junior Rangers program is for children and families who want to accept the challenge and fun of learning about the river and then share what they learn with others. If people know about the Lamprey River and share their love of the river, people and animals will continue to enjoy the river well into the future.
