TALES FROM EPPING'S PAST HIGH FLYING FLAGS IN EPPING



About one hundred and fifty years ago, across from where the Epping Town Hall is now, there once was a house where Dr. Nathaniel Batchelder lived with his wife and their daughter Emily. Back then, the bridge right there was known to all as "Batchelder's Bridge." Dr. Batchelder himself, besides caring for the sick, was inclined to display large flags around his place. He also once sued one of his own patients as well as the Town of Epping and was not generally thought to be a very prudent person.

At the very time when men and boys from all over the northeast were fighting in the Civil War and getting killed trying to keep this country together, Dr Nat decided to come out as a solid supporter of the South, for a permanently divided America, for slavery, and for all the rest of it. He covered the front door of his house with a Confederate flag. He started making speeches to increasingly hostile crowds. He was bodily picked up and carried out of a citizens' meeting by a young Epping soldier and then run out of town to the One account had him tarred and Exeter jail. feathered along the way. Newspapers carried stories about Dr. Nathaniel Batchelder, "the Epping secessionist." They also published the rambling letters he wrote defending himself from behind bars.

Dr. Batchelder was moved to the prison at Fort Constitution over in Portsmouth for his "anti-union views and speeches given in Epping" - and undoubtedly for his own safety. Like any other Confederate prisoner of war he had to take the Oath of Allegiance to the United States before being released.

Free at last! - and finally back home in Epping, - the man lost no time in hoisting up a "large flag of pure white on a 75 foot pole." His long suffering wife and daughter packed up, moved out, and opened a hat shop in Exeter.

Years later, Emily Batchelder returned home alone to try to reconcile and care for her father. Sadly, left with very little after he died, she rattled around the old place for years until finally taken to what was then called the County Hospital and Asylum in Brentwood where she died in 1896. However, she was here in Epping when the old Batchelder Bridge was improved and lit by modern lanterns, when Watson Academy was built on the hill and when the fine new Epping Town Hall went up across the road on land her father had donated. She was here in 1881, when Dr Abram Mitchell and his family moved in next door to her, into what is now the home of Greg and Lisa Dodge.

Dr. Abram Mitchell devotedly served the people of this town for almost fifty years. You could call him anytime and he would come - by horse, sleigh or on foot. Later on, he had a Model T Ford with skis on the front and chains on the rear tires for winter house calls. He stayed as long as was needed and charged 50 cents per visit.

Dr. Mitchell was so respected that when he retired in 1930, his letter of resignation as the Rockingham County Physician was refused and he was awarded an unlimited leave of absence with privileges instead. In 1935, when a new General Hospital was built to replace the old County Hospital and Asylum where Emily Batchelder had died, the new building was named in his honor. It still stands and now houses our County Extension services and other Administrative offices in Brentwood.

Dr. Mitchell gave the land where our Harvey-Mitchell Library is now. He donated land in back of the Town Hall, as well as acres along the river to be used by the Boy Scouts and as a community park. Our American Legion Post # 51 bears the name of one of his sons, Lieut. Richard Andrew Mitchell.

Among its many good works, the Mitchell American Legion Post of Epping puts up all those beautiful American flags we see flying over our streets each Memorial Day. The thirteen stripes on each flag represent our original thirteen colonies and those fifty bright stars remind us all that as fifty states united as one, we remain a nation strong and indivisible under God: The United States of America.

And who said history isn't interesting?

Epping Historical Society

The Epping Historical Society, on behalf of the Board of Selectmen, presented the Boston Post Cane to a new owner in a ceremony on July 25, at the Epping Town Hall. The Cane, which traditionally goes to the town's oldest resident, was given to Bertha Denoncour, 91. Joy True of the Historical Society made the presentation. Epping's Boston Post Cane had not had an owner since 2007. Annie Wells was its previous owner. The current cane is a replica of the original, which became lost around the time of World War II. The tradition of awarding the Boston Post Cane to a town's oldest resident was launched in 1909, by The Boston Post newspaper. The paper presented canes to hundreds of New England towns, many of which continue today to distribute these original canes.

In other Historical Society news, the Society's membership formally elected a Board of Directors as of August 15th. Michael Vose was elected President, with Sandy Goodspeed, Vice President; Pam Currier, Treasurer; Carol Ann Bonenfant, Secretary; and Joy True, Member-at-Large.

The Society's staff continues to make improvements at the 11 Water Street building. The former kitchen area has been converted to store and display genealogy notebooks. Efforts are underway to improve the telephone system and create a Website and Facebook presence for the Epping Historical Society. The staff has begun working on signs that will be placed at the site of the now-demolished Bunker Pond (Folsom) Dam.

Epping Community Church

Epping Community Church is always pleased to welcome visitors. Visiting a church where you have never attended or where it may have been years since you last visited, can be an intimidating experience. It can be particularly intimidating when the word "religion" is attached.

What will you find if you choose to visit us on any given Sunday morning?

You will find a warm and welcoming group of people who are pleased to have you present. You will not be pressured or forced in any way to join, commit, or put your name on the dotted line regarding joining our church membership. We always welcome a new member, but want individuals to join when they feel God leading them to be part of the spiritual life of our church.

Worship is held every Sunday morning at 9:00 am and the service will last from one hour to an hour and fifteen minutes. Across the course of each month you will hear a variety of music.

Epping Community Church is blessed with a wonderful choir, a bell choir and a Praise Band. Music will vary from traditional and classic choral to contemporary praise, blues, jazz, and country gospel.

The pastor's sermons are generally didactic and include dialogue. You are invited to encounter the Good News of the Gospel in a contemporary and faithful context to the Word of God.

We observe communion (the Lord's Supper) on the first Sunday morning of each month. All followers of Christ are welcomed to the table.

Support of the church comes through voluntary contributions of those who attend our church. We exist for one reason, to serve God. Our Food Pantry, Coats of Caring Closet, and other programs are present not because of works, but because fruit is borne out of the right relationship with God in Christ.

There is opportunity to gather in Fellowship Hall following worship if you wish to mingle, get to know a few people better, and enjoy a beverage and light snack.

There is a modified non-traditional Sunday School for children – a classroom without walls and Bible teaching unconfined. We teach a positive message of Good News to our children. You are always welcome at Bible study on Thursday mornings at 9:00 am and to participate in our Thursday morning prayer group at 10:00 am.

We have Thursday Soup of the Day Café on Thursdays from 11:00 am – 12:30 pm. A wonderful opportunity presents itself around a tasty luncheon on Thursdays. September through June there are generally two types of homemade soups available and plenty of fellowship around the table. During July and August, when things are much warmer, the ladies fix a variety of salads for lunch.

The Food Pantry is open on Thursdays and Saturdays from 9:00 to 11:00 am. Serving family and individuals who find themselves in difficult circumstances, a variety of food items (perishable and non-perishable) are made available. The Pantry is accessible once weekly. Included on the menu will be mashed potatoes, butternut squash, stuffing, green beans, gravy, cranberry sauce, cornbread and butter, homemade pies and beverage. Serving will be from 5 to 7 pm for \$8.00, under 12 for \$4.00. You don't need a reservation and all funds raised go toward the building program. Friday Night Pizza night resumes the first Friday evening of September and is open from 5:00 – 7:00 pm. A fundraiser for the building program, Friday Night Pizza offers a large pizza with the toppings of your desire for \$8.00. You can eat it in or take it home. Calling ahead (679-5542) will allow you to pick your pizza up hot and ready for eating. The pizza dough is our own recipe and each pizza is hand tossed for your eating pleasure.

The Library Trustees have begun their journey to expand our library building. President Nan Nutt made a presentation to the selectmen citing the need for a 2.24 million dollar, 14,000 foot expansion to include an elevator, a community room for meetings and programs, study rooms, a room for the Historical Society and its collections, display area for local artists, and more space for shelving, browsing, studying, and space to utilize public computers.

The current building opened in 1964, and houses approximately 21,000 items. In 2010 the library set records with 39,636 items circulated and 31,809 visitors. We are bursting at the seams! It's time to allow the library to grow to meet the everincreasing needs of our town. Watch for an Open House to be scheduled this fall for Epping residents and library patrons to explore the existing building, observe its current limitations, and discuss the possibilities for the future.
