Rockingham County Daytime Activities for Seniors

The Rockingham County Adult Medical Day Program offers a safe environment for seniors who continue to live at home but because of health problems, physical limitations or memory loss are unable to stay alone durina the An experienced staff provides numerous services including nursing supervision, health monitoring, exercise and walking programs, medication administration and assistance with personal hygiene. Speech. occupational and physical therapies are available as needed. A well-balanced nutritional program provides delicious meals and snacks that are offered at no extra cost to program participants.

Basic goals of adult day services are to help individuals maintain their cognitive, physical and functional abilities by promoting mental alertness, physical activity and socialization. To achieve those aims, the Center provides a robust and varied schedule of physical activities, social outings and recreation programs.

Activities include: word games, board games, cards, current events discussions, arts and crafts. field trips, movies, restaurant trips, and picnics, shopping trips, manicures and holiday celebrations. Attentive staff works closely with individuals to create a pleasant, up-beat environment while giving support and assistance throughout the day. Group activities are encouraged, but accommodation is easily made for those times when a person prefers to pursue an individual activity or to take a short rest period. The Adult Medical Day Program provides respite for caregivers who need some additional support and time away from their responsibilities. While the participant enjoys time at the Center, families can work, spend time with other family members or friends or get needed rest and relaxation.

The Program is located at the Rockingham County Complex at 117 North Road in Brentwood. The Center operates Monday through Friday from 7:00 AM to 5:00 PM. Interested persons may call 679-5335 ex. 9156 for more information or to schedule a tour of the center.

- * Expand needed area for the food pantry outreach;
- * Provide needed area for Coats of Caring article distribution and the addition of some clothing items;
- * Provide additional kitchen, cooking, and storage space in support of our various outreach programs;
- * Provide rental space for a "Community Center" space that serves birthday, anniversary, family reunion, receptions and corporate gatherings;
- * Provide for anticipated after school outreach programming
- Provide space supportive to Scoutina:
- * Provide adequate rooms for Sunday School / Christian Education programs;

- Provision of Ground floor entry and elevator access to all levels of the building. This will better serve those with mobility concerns
- * Provision of an elevator for Funeral, Memorial and other community Services:
- * Nursery accommodations for parents of babies and preschoolers;
- * Practice and warm up area for worship team members, soloists, bell choir and others involved in preparing for worship services.

- * The future needs as God guides and directs us in His service.
- * Provision of staff offices.

News from the Historical Society

Madelyn Williamson was in Concord on February 18th representing Epping and the Historical Society as the keynote speaker at the dedication of the New Hampshire State Archive building to William Plumer. Also present at the dedication and small breakfast were Gov. Lynch, the Executive Council and other state officials. A wonderful portrait of William Plumer was unveiled. There will be a public ceremony sometime in May at the New Hampshire Archives Building on Fruit Street in Concord where the Plumer portrait is hung.

The Historical Society is now celebrating its 37th year of service as the resource center for information on Epping's special history, people and events. The Society's collections include a wide variety of historical displays, street and town maps, family records from 1741, old documents and photos. Additionally they offer unique а computerized index of Epping's over cemeteries.

The Society presents special programs and activities throughout the year. All are announced, free and open to the public. They are taped and the tapes are available to the public.

The Epping Historical Society continues to present scholarships to Epping students majoring in history.

The Society building, located on Water Street next to the park, is closed during hazardous weather conditions. However, Madelyn Williamson at 679-5482 or Joy True 679-8855 welcome a call anytime for an appointment or information.

Spring is coming! The days are getting longer, the snow might melt by May, and we at the library are beginning to prepare for spring programs and summer reading! If you haven't made use of the library lately, stop by to see what's here. Some of the most exciting additions to our collection this month are not even books, but new bookcases. In order to make the children's room a more flexible space for meetings, movies and popular programs, we now have mobile picture book shelves, custom made by the NH Correctional Industries Wood Shop in Concord, which complement the taller shelves they made for us in 2005. The children's room had to be rearranged to work in the new shelves and to move the computer tables closer to the circulation desk, because new computers are on their way for the kids! The staff is most grateful

to our patrons for bearing with us during the redecorating process.

During these financially trying times please remember nearly everything here at the library is free, made possible by your tax dollars. We are constantly ordering best selling fiction, relevant non-fiction, new kids books, current DVDs and popular magazines, and can get just about anything you're looking for through the state-wide interlibrary loan network. If you don't see it here, just ask...we'll try to get it for you. There are 4 patron computers with internet for public use, plus wireless internet available to those with their own laptops. We have copying and faxing services (for a small fee), and a variety of programs for both children and adults. The library is open Monday through Friday from 10 am to 8 pm and Saturdays from 10 to 2 pm.

News from the Darryl J. Rice Memorial Media Center:

New additions to the reference collection include a Teen Finance Series. This four volume set will support the business curriculum and help students learn money management skills. Topics include credit, debt, college financing, savings, and investment. New subject encyclopedias on holidays and festivals, biotechnology, and world mythology may also be found in reference.

For the general nonfiction collection, a series on Dictatorships will support history courses. Another series entitled "Images and Issues of Women in the Twentieth Century" with its focus on popular culture will be useful in a number of English and history courses.

Recently the software for the online library catalog was downloaded to each media center computer. This allows students to search for library materials from any library computer, as well as gain access to the eBook collection. It is hoped that the library catalog will be web-based in the future and accessible to students and staff from any school computer and from home.

Sophomore Class News:

The sophomores just wrapped up mid-year exams and are off to a fresh start second semester. Sophomores with signed permission slips who are interested in attending SST next year took a field trip to the school on Wed. Feb. 11 to view the programs. Academically, the Sophomores will be studying electricity and magnetism in Science, and will be writing 15 vignettes on their own lives in English, modeled after the book "The House on Mango Street" by Sandra Cisneros. In Sophomore Seminar, Ms Leavitt and Mr. Cotreau from Guidance will be working with the students on the topics covered in the Frontline program "Growing Up Online".

Humanities Department

The Humanities Department continues to offer students many choices within the classroom. This month we would like to highlight freshmen English. Mr. Granbery, our freshmen English teacher, is working with his students in literacy circles. This is what Mr. Granbery writes about his classes:

"The freshmen English class is reading literature that progresses on a time line, within Western Civilization, from the ancient world towards the Renaissance. Their current unit is a historical novel reading using a literacy circle strategy. Students choose from among three historical fiction books that take place in the time period being highlighted..The literacy circle is an unusual approach to class assigned reading. Students have selected a book and grouped themselves into teams all reading the same book. Each day each student picks a job to do in addition to their reading assignment. These jobs include the discussion director, the summarizer, the quote finder, passage

picker, vocabulary finder and illustrator. The literacy circle meets each class and students present their homework. Each homework assignment has a component that is completed by the group. The literacy circle has other tasks as well. There are several questions to be answered for each reading and there is a character map that filled out as the reading progresses. An advantage literacy circles have over the conventional "teach the book" approach is that students have choices. They choose the book and they choose their jobs. Another advantage is that students are responsible to each other for their readings and their work. The grading is structured so that a student who doesn't do his work only lowers his own grade, but each completed assignment "earns" the group points. Students also enjoy the social aspect of the group, which mimics adult book groups, yet the social aspect is controlled by a system of points awarded for being on task. We hope the literacy circle will inspire the enjoyment and habit of reading."

The Humanities department has also completed guidelines for writing a thesis that will be used across our department. We are serving as the pilot group with the hopes that our final product will be used by all teachers. The advantage to students is that the same clear expectations for writing will be used by all teachers.

The Humanities department completed a scope and sequence of what content will be taught at each grade level and in each course in order that we build on the content that is taught in grades 9 through 12. We are in the process of now building a scope and sequence of skills taught at each level. This will help students learn to use higher order thinking skills at each grade level. Looking at both content and skills will also help us refine the competencies in each course as is mandated by the state.

Epping High School's Art Department is proud to announce the winners of this year's Scholastic Arts State Competition. Under the direction of Tobey Harman, eleven keys were awarded out of a possible fifteen to the creative students of Epping High School. Artworks submitted ranged from all mediums: from paintings, to sculptures, to pottery, students from all grades received a key.

The Scholastic Arts is a competition for students from all across the state of New Hampshire. Students must follow difficult guidelines when submitting their work, and if chosen receive one of

three recognitions: Gold key, Silver Key, or Honorable Mention. The judging of each submitted piece of artwork is reviewed by the pieces' originality, technical proficiency, and emergence of a personal vision.

Only fifteen pieces of work are allowed to be submitted per art teacher, leaving Tobey Harman with a difficult task of choosing what should be submitted with such a low amount of slots, compared to other schools. "Out of so much talent in the school, it makes it an impossible task to select only fifteen pieces. I encouraged teachers, students, and administrators to come in and give their opinion in the selection."

The Wellness Committee consists of a group of individuals representing the school and community, including parents, students, food service representatives, school board members, school administrators, teachers, health professionals and members of the public. The Wellness Committee works within the schools to develop, implement, monitor, review and, as necessary, revise school nutrition and physical activity policies. The committee also serves as a resource for schools in implementing those policies.

Each committee meets four times a year, usually on a Wednesday immediately following school (2:45 for Middle & High, 3:30 for Elementary). We welcome community members who do not have

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
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
