As the holidays begin their annual pull on our time and our wallets, we at the library would like to begin the season by saying thank you to our wonderful patrons. Through staff changes, policy revisions and furniture re-arrangements you have been steadfast, supporting the efforts we make to provide the best little town library we can manage. Without people to borrow books, recommend movies and attend programs the library would just be another 45 year old building full of stuff. The sense of community that we all feel here makes it a warm and welcoming place to work and to visit. We hope all of you, regardless of your life stresses, find ways to enjoy the season that is upon us.

The library will be closed for the following holidays in November and December: Wednesday, November 11 Veteran's Day Thursday, November 26 Thanksgiving Friday, December 25 Christmas Day

The library is usually open Monday through Friday from 10am to 8pm and Saturdays from 10am to 2pm.

Did you know that the library typically receives 3 to 5 boxes of donated books and other media each week? Though we try to incorporate donations into our collection, most of them end up either in our Book Sale Room or going to the transfer station for paper recycling. We send some of our donated items to a great company called Better World Books (look them up online at Betterworldbooks.com), but even they have limitations on what they will accept. Folks who make use of the Book Sale Room can find some great bargains with hardcover titles selling for 50 cents and paperbacks selling for 25 cents. Audio books (mostly on cassette) and VHS tapes sell for one dollar each and all proceeds go to the Friends of the Library. Unfortunately, the donations always seem to outweigh the sales, and our Book Sale Room is filled to bursting. Because of this, we have decided to stop accepting donations of adult books Miss Tracie will still for the foreseeable future. accept hardcover children's books and movies on DVD or VHS, but asks that you seek family members and friends to share with before you bring your donations here. Below is a more detailed look at some of the happenings at EMS.

#### Nature's Classroom

The Epping Middle School went to Nature's Classroom during the week of October 13 for four days of an exciting educational experience at the Nature's classroom site in Freedom, NH. The children were joined by Ms. Weisberg, Mr. Mosca, Mrs. Vertetis and Mrs. Bozek, Mr. DeGruttola, Ms. Lins, Mr. Christman, Mrs. Healy, Mr. Repucci, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. LaPlante. There they studied the natural environment, participated in outdoor academic classes, and joined with their teachers and classmates in a learning growing community.

Natural science was the primary task of morning field walks at Nature's Classroom. During these walks the children were shown and asked to consider the interrelationships in the outdoor world. The field groups saw plants, animals and people coexisting in complex living systems.

Afternoon class periods at Nature's Classroom allowed the students to choose from a wide variety of special interest activities. One student might want to help build a bridge while someone else might participate in an edible foods hunt and others would pick the fast paced Adventure Team course. Whichever was chosen, the goal remained the same: to demonstrate the vital link between academic subjects and real life experiences. Each Nature's Classroom teacher strove to illustrate the importance of the effective use of language arts abilities, mathematical concepts, scientific methods, and social studies skills taught in the home school. Exciting class activities provided the students and their teachers with an increased motivation to return to their learning process and a refreshed attitude toward their academic life.

The group's sense of community was strengthened by experiences like: living in a cabin with teachers and peers, helping set tables for meals, taking turns serving food, and sharing responsibility for cleaning up. These experiences, along with the overall Nature's Classroom program, help the group to develop a greater respect and appreciation for one another as valuable members of the whole community.

Square dances and campfires are two of the most popular evening events at Nature's Classroom. Some students volunteered to perform songs or skits while many others discovered the fun and excitement of live entertainment. Occasionally kids asked their teachers to dance! Other evening activities were: night hikes, science fairs and environmental hearings.

At Nature's Classroom we saw how the sun provides warmth and light for things to grow in nature, and the students who came to Nature's Classroom began to see more clearly how their school and their teachers help guide them to develop as healthy, happy individuals.

We hope that the students and their teachers returned from Nature's Classroom with a deeper sense of responsibility for their community and a stronger commitment to living in harmony with their world.

## The Art of Suspense - Art and Writing Show Held at EMS!

Over the first two months of school every member of Epping Middle School's 8th grade Language Arts classes worked with their LA teacher, Mr. Fersch and their Art teacher, Mrs. Booth on their first major project. It started off with working on short story writing skills and was greatly enhanced as Mrs. Booth devoted her artistic knowledge in helping the students chose a piece of artwork which they then used as the setting for the suspense story based on a character they had previously created. The result of this hard work was a four-panel interpretation of a famous piece of art work that went hand in hand with a short story written by the student. In addition, each student chose music to be the soundtrack of their story and several of these pieces were shared throughout the night, both live and pre-recorded. On the night of October 28, the multi-media art show, complete with art, writing, refreshments, costumes and raffles, was enjoyed by all.
