Rockingham Adult Day Program

Adult Medical Day Services: A Solution for a Growing Need

Many families overlook the adult medical day program as a practical option for senior care.

Many caregivers who work outside the home are unable to stay home to care for loved ones. In addition, caregivers who do not work outside the home may wish a break from care-giving to run errands, socialize, or simply to rest. When you look at the concept of adult medical day programs, one would think that obviously, it is a much needed service. After all, how many people are struggling to care for aging parents, spouses, grandparents and siblings?

The truth is that many people have never heard of adult day health care. Yet there is a convenient and reasonably priced opportunity for families to keep loved ones at home with them. It is the adult medical day program.

The cost of an adult medical day program is less than a nursing home and private home care. Many long-term care insurance programs will cover the cost of adult medical day programs.

The Rockingham County Adult Medical Day Program in Brentwood provides daily structured programs in an attractive and protective setting for individuals with chronic illnesses, physical disability, dementia and other problems that increase their care needs. One difference between traditional adult respite, both group and in-home care, and adult day programs is that adult day centers not only provide respite to family caregivers but also therapeutic care for cognitively and physically impaired older adults.

The adult day program allows caregivers to continue working outside the home, receive help with the physical care of a loved one, avoid the need of placing a loved one in institutional care, and have a break from what can be a "24/7" responsibility.

A typical day at the Rockingham County Adult Medical Day program includes a varied schedule of small group and individual activities intended to support mental alertness, promote physical activity and encourage social engagement. The social and recreation activities include music, arts and crafts, exercise and walking programs, board games, discussion groups, spiritual services, field trips and seasonal celebrations. Support services such as nursing care, health education, assistance with activities of daily living, occupational, speech and

physical therapies are customized to each participant's needs.

Adult day services are a welcome respite opportunity for caregivers who work or who need stretches of time away from their loved one to complete tasks, socialize or just relax and renew. School District Communication

School Board Meeting Schedule

<u>Influenza</u>

The District has taken special steps to minimize the impact of the flu. The best rule is: if you are sick, stay home. Students and staff that become ill at school will be isolated and sent home. Please stay home until fever free without fever reducing medications. Health advisories and information can be viewed on the District website under Parents & Community.

Data Team News

The data team met and discussed a format for and specific testing goals for the 2009-2010 school year. The format looks at median scores in three areas each year for the 9th, 10th and 11th grade classes. The 9th and 10th grade will compare this year's NWEA scores to those earned the previous year. The 11th grade will compare this year's NECAP to the previous years NWEAs. We will use

the NWEA to NECAP conversion tables we developed last month. The overall goal is to have goals that are challenging and attainable with testing supported by our preparation program. The goals follow:

The median student 9th grade score will see an equal to or greater than 18 month increase from 8th grade NWEAs. The class of 2013 is coming from the middle school with high scores. Their math and reading score are above national average, so a goal of one and a half years growth seems aggressive.

The median student 10th grade scores will see an equal to or greater than 1 year growth from the 9th grade NWEAs and will equal or exceed national 10th grade level standards. The class of 2013 is also above national average except in math. These students on average saw two years gain last year, so one year growth in reading and language as well as a more than one year growth in math to national standard seems consistent with the overall goal.

The median student 11th grade NECAPs to reflect the NWEA predicted level or higher. As the NWEAs were given in the spring and the NECAPs are given in the fall, this goal seems challenging. Typically students lose about a 1/3 year growth when tested fall against previous year spring, so staying level over this period actually represents growth.

We hope having a program that has meaningful preparation and tracks performance over three years will support a culture that welcomes and performs well on standardized testing.

Spotlight on Business

Twin Pines Driving Range

Article from Golfsmith Clubmaker

Bill Langdon is a man of action. When he sees a golfer struggling with his golf game, he is quick to come up with a solution. When technology shifts and he needs to learn a new clubmaking procedure or purchase a new tool, he reacts faster than tourgrade shafting epoxy.

The New Hampshire native may wear a shop apron instead of a cape, but his customers think he is super. Interestingly, it was Langdon's need to play more golf with his dad, Jerry, that led to his thriving club-making business at Twin Pines Driving Range in Epping, New Hampshire.

"After three years of driving 45 minutes one way to hit golf balls with my dad, we decided to go into business together and start a golf driving range in 1999," Langdon said.

Today, Langdon's golfing fortress includes a 1,600 square-foot workshop packed with nearly every clubmaking tool known to man. Since Epping, population 6,200, is no Metropolis, the veteran clubmaker has to rely on word-of-mouth advertising and strategically-placed advertising to attract golfers. Regional television spots during major PGA golf tournaments, sponsorships of 20 to 30 local tournaments annually and a keen sense of community have helped him build an impressive client list.

"It also helps that we own a heated driving range/practice center/repair and fitting shop," Langdon, the Golf Clubmakers Association's (GCA) 2005-2006 New Hampshire Clubmaker of the Year, added. "I have many avenues to both promote and grow my business."

Throughout the year, Twin Pines holds several golf clinics and gives lessons to area school children at discounted rates. During the summer months, Langdon even offers free weekly golf lessons to approximately 50 kids ranging in ages from eight to 11. While his first goal is to make sure golfers are fitted with the right golf clubs, his second objective is to convert more golfers, especially younger players, to the sport.

Giving back to his community via charitable contributions is also also important to this father of two sons — Christopher and Michael. He gave an estimated \$3,000 to charitable organizations in 2005.

My sons have autism so I'm a firm believer that the more you give in time and money, the more you can encourage and help someone who is physically challenged," Langdon said. "I think my customers also appreciate my motto — the more you give of yourself, the greater the rewards."


