## 2010 Census: Get Paid to Make a Difference

The Census takes a snapshot of the U.S. population, determining how many people reside within the nation's borders, who they are and where they live. This includes individuals of all ages, races and ethnic groups - both citizens and non-citizens. Data about how communities are changing are crucial to many planning decisions - such as neighborhood improvements, emergency preparedness and disaster recovery, public health, education, transportation, senior services and much more.

All personal information provided in the census form is kept private and is protected by federal law.

The 2010 Census questionnaire will be mailed or delivered to Epping residents in March 2010, and the U.S. Census Bureau is aiming for a 100 percent response rate. Heads of households are required by law to accurately complete the short questionnaire that contains only a few simple questions regarding their residence.

The U.S. Census Bureau is now recruiting in Epping and surrounding towns. All census jobs have paid training. Census takers earn \$15.00/hr and mileage reimbursement.

## The Civil War Roundtable of NH

In the spring of 1991, a small group of Civil War enthusiasts (buffs) decided to form an official club, the Civil War Roundtable of New Hampshire. Their first meeting was in May 1991. The concept was to share with others the interest in this time of American history where so much changed. The fulcrum of American history from 1861-1865 took us from a collection of states to a country where the collection united was supreme and a place where no person could own another wherever the laws of the U. S. Constitution ruled.

As the years rolled by, some members came and others left the monthly group. Local historians and amateur historians, often from the roundtable itself. presented topics within the realm of the Civil War. Often professors from regional colleges or universities and nationally known historians and Park Rangers from Civil War Battlefields would descend upon Epping and present talks on an even deeper study. Many of these men and women have been seen on the History Channel or PBS and many have come more than once! Some of the guests who've come over the years are: Ed Bearss, Robert E. L. Krick, Brian Pohanka, Wayne Motts, Stephen B. Oates, James I "Bud" Robertson, Craig L. Symonds, Scott Hartwig, Gloria Swift, Kate Clifford Larson, Elizabeth Leonard, Tom Desjardin, and more. (Google these names and you'll see how lucky we've been!)

Typical meetings begin with a bit of social time and an opportunity to peruse the book raffle table. Each meeting, an assortment of donated books is up for grabs at \$1/ticket or 6 for \$5. We then go over some announcements and a quick rundown of any business or items of interest, then have a presentation by a speaker. Topics range from famous battlefields such as Gettysburg, Antietam, Petersburg, Franklin or Bull Run to lesser-known battles such as Monocacy and Balls Bluff. Featured meetings have covered notable people including Abraham Lincoln, Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson, Joshua Chamberlain, Mary Surratt, Robert E. Lee, John Brown, Col. Edward Cross (of the famous 5<sup>th</sup> NH Regiment) and others! A meeting might also cover specific machinery and innovations of the war, such as the use of railroads, covert operations and codes, news correspondents, naval operations, POW camps and more. After a 45-50 minute talk, the speaker opens the floor to questions and if he or she has written a book, will often offer to sign books.

In addition to the programs, the CWRT of NH has enjoyed some field trips. We've journeyed to Fort Warren (the famous POW camp in Boston Harbor), the Joshua L. Chamberlain Museum in Brunswick, ME and to Neill Avenue in Gettysburg, a little known section off the National Park maps that played a significant role in the battle and where few souls visit.

Our group enjoys sharing our adventures, our finds and our stories with one another. We feature members who have only recently discovered the American epic and others who have spent a lifetime reading, learning and visiting anything related to the Civil War, near and far.

As the year 2011 nears, the country will begin commemorating the Civil War's Sesquicentennial (150<sup>th</sup> anniversary). We at the Civil War roundtable of New Hampshire feel poised on an upswing in interest for this remarkable time. The stories, the people, the places and the truly American thread compel so many of us to this time.

We are open to the public and welcome people of all ages and backgrounds. If you wish, you can become a member and join us in our pursuit of history! Our meetings are held in the Epping Town Hall, usually on the third Friday of the month, with no meetings in July, August or December. They begin at 7:15 with doors opening at 6:45. 

Congratulations to Epping School Students and Staff

Congratulations to Epping School Students and Staff. The New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) results are in for 2009. Reading proficiency for grades 3 to 8 increased for the fifth year in a row with 78% of students proficient in reading. Reading proficiency for grade 11 increased significantly from last school year with 74% of students proficient in reading. Students also performed above state average as shown below.



The NECAP writing test was only given to grade 11 students. Student writing proficiency increased significantly from last year with 58% writing proficiency in comparison to 50% at the state level.

The school district has placed an emphasis on reading and writing and the results of these efforts are evidenced in these results. Thank you to students and staff who have worked incredibly hard to improve learning. Math results were mixed. The district will need to place a similar emphasis on mathematics. According to New Hampshire state law, children cannot enter school without these documents. Parents are urged to schedule appointments with their physicians for a health examination if they have not done so yet.

The March 10th meeting is for parents, guardians and the school staff so that there is time to explain the kindergarten program, answer questions and schedule screening appointments. Children should not attend this meeting. They will be welcome at all other times.
