# TALES FROM EPPING'S PAST OFF TO A ROUGH START

Like Exeter, from which we separated in 1741 to become Epping, we also began as a community organized around a Congregational Church. To entice its first minister and buy him a house, our taxes were upped two cents an acre and a committee appointed to search for a suitable candidate. Another group was to build the church, which was also going to be used for public town meetings, in other words, the original Epping Town Hall.

The spot chosen for this first church/meetinghouse is quaintly described to be in the "santer" of town, now in the Central Cemetery area, but then on land owned by Jonathan Norris, a local Quaker. The building, known as The Church of Christ Congregational. Second Parish in measured 50' x 40'. In the style of the time it probably had a south main entrance, box pews, upper gallery for single men and women, servants and slaves, and a raised pulpit. It was ready when the first minister - Mr. Robert Cutler and his family arrived, despite his paltry salary offer, this isolated location, and some heavy grumbling from the Search Committee which had tried hard to get somebody else for the job.

Robert Cutler had graduated bottom of the 1744 class of Harvard Divinity School after he stole the shoes of another student and then denied it. He was ordained in Epping in 1747, the same year this

town was so beset by Indian attacks that people were petitioning for outside help. His wife died here about two years later leaving him with four small children and even poorer when he was denied help with her burial expenses. Then, in 1753, a bunch of religious fanatics called "Ranters", dedicated to breaking up organized churches, targeted Epping to taunt Cutler and likely traumatized the congregation with "wild singing and dancing, screaming, bellowing and the ripping of their clothes." Three years later, the Search Committee found itself again busily at work searching for another minister after Mr. Cutler left town having been found guilty of extreme misconduct. This time the Committee greatly succeeded when Josiah Stearns. esteemed minister and American patriot, agreed to come to Epping from Billerica, Massachusetts in 1758, to devotedly serve and guide the Church and all its people for many years thereafter, including through the Revolutionary War.

And during all this time, Jonathan Norris, the prior owner of the land on which the Church stood, had never missed a chance to heckle and accuse the town fathers of having cheated him on the deal. For over twenty years he had loudly disrupted services in the Church, the one place where nobody even thought to hum, and had been jailed and heavily fined for refusing to pay his taxes to support the ministers. Finally, one cold night in 1770, a group of exasperated townsmen invaded his house, got him out of bed and whipped the now "old and long bearded" man.

But not only did the old boy survive, after healing up, he defiantly headed off to Court, identified each of his tormentors, sued, - and won his case. Vindicated at long last, Jonathan Norris, our "obstinate" Epping Quaker, may very well have continued his heckling whenever it suited him, until the day he died.

# EPPING HISTORICAL SOCIETY INFORMATIONAL OPEN HOUSE

The Epping Historical Society invites the public to an Informational Open House on Wednesday, March 23, at 7:00 pm at the Society's building on Water Street in Epping. This free of charge event features a program of news and information about the Society, followed by a presentation about

former New Hampshire Governor William Plumer. A brief social with refreshments concludes the evening. In a snow emergency, the event moves to March 30.

Now in its 41st year, the Epping Historical Society seeks to preserve the heritage of Epping, NH, which was incorporated in 1741 by then Provincial Governor Benning Wentworth. The Society houses a rich and varied store of primary source documents, out-of-print historical books, and museum-quality artifacts from Epping's past. Many of these items will be on display during the open house.

This informational session presents a brief history of the Society, an overview of its By-Laws, a description of what can be found within its walls, and information about the Society's cemetery preservation efforts. Society representatives will explain what the Society can offer to individual citizens and to the community at large. The program also features an overview of the life of one of Epping's most famous sons, William Plumer. This 15-20 minute presentation seeks to highlight some of the notable events in the life of this acclaimed Epping citizen, who served in the U.S. Senate as well as two terms as Governor of New Hampshire.

The Society currently seeks volunteers to serve on its Board of Directors, and to help staff future programs. The Building Trustees hope to find volunteers who can donate time to assist with building maintenance and upgrades. The Society's building originally housed an A&P Supermarket dating to 1923. The market moved to other quarters in the early 1950s and subsequent owners donated the structure to the Society in the1970's.

# Open Letter to the People of Epping from the Epping Dump Kitties

Hi, this is Dudley. You may have seen me sitting in a puddle of sunshine in the third bay of the garage at the Transfer Station. I'm the great big handsome orange cat with the big gold eyes! My family (known as the Epping Dump Kitties) asked me to write an article for the Speak Up, Epping! Newsletter – with a little help typing it up from our "Auntie".

We just want to thank everyone in Epping that has been helping to keep us warm and fed for the past few years. We work very hard to keep the yummy rodent population here at the dump under control without dangerous chemicals but every now and then the little critters are hard to find – especially when it's really cold outside. That's when we especially appreciate all the dry kibbles and the occasional can of wet cat food you leave for us at the dump. Other times, especially in the summer when we can spend all day and part of the night hunting, we just need a little food and lots of fresh water to keep us going strong

We really love the snuggly spot the Transfer Station employees and our regular visitors have made for us. The blankets, dog houses, kitty condos and big blue tarp have turned what used to be a big cold space into a snuggly home for us. Even in all the bitter cold and snow we've had this winter we've been very snuggly!

You may wonder where we came from, but the truth is while some of us (like me) were born here at the dump, my Mom started out as a housecat but got dropped off here when her owner discovered she was pregnant. Luckily for us our Auntie took us to the doctor's a few years ago (what a harrowing experience that was!) to get all our shots and big boy/big girl operations.

Now we have a nice stable family of nine grown up cats that are all happy and healthy and very willing to do our part to lower the cost of running the Transfer Station. In return all we ask is that you continue to donate any dry food or (even leftover) canned wet food you may have and check to make sure we have fresh water whenever you stop by. You can leave it in the third bay of the dump garage (by the big blue tarp) or even at the Swap Shop – we have a couple of very sweet "Uncles" in there that help us out all the time, too.

We're much more scared of you than you should

be of us so while you should never let kids try to pet us, they can come visit too. Just call out "hello" when you approach our home and slowly move the tarp aside – and be sure to put it back well to block the cold air. You may never see us, but we'll be watching and sending you lots of love back.
