All outside burns must have a burn permit. These are available at the Fire Department between 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. weekdays and from 5 to 5:30 P.M. on weekends and holiday. With the permit you will get a flyer with the N H Department of Forest and Lands regulations. Fires may only be burned from 5 P.M. to 9 A.M, unless it is raining out. Individuals with seasonal permits should call the station at 679-5446 during business hours or on Saturday and/or Sunday between 5 and 5:30 P.M. to check on the fire danger and to advise the Fire Department that they will be burning.

Epping Food Pantry

The Epping Community Church food pantry has seen an extraordinary increase in needs and utilization that began early this year. Our food pantry is open on Thursday mornings from 9:00am until 11:00am and on Saturday mornings from 9:00am until 11:00am. This past Saturday twentyfour families and individuals came to the pantry to help them get through difficult times. This past Thursday we had over that same number seeking help from the food pantry. If the volume continues it appears we will serve somewhere between 2,000 and 2,500 families and individuals over the course of twelve months.

We are thankful to St. Joseph's Catholic Church for their partnership in providing toiletry essentials and other basic need items. Schools, post office, scouts, Starbucks, the Crandall bakeries and others have also contributed as partners to meeting the needs of many from around our community. A special thank you to all who have been involved in supporting the Food Pantry efforts. Most of all we thank God for the opportunity to serve and minister in this way.

Thursday Soup Café

We began serving soup on Thursdays not long ago. Generally there are two types of soup available and it is free to those who wish to come and join in sharing food and fellowship with one another. The Thursday Soup Café is serving from 11:00am – 12:30pm.


