Epping Recreation and the New Epping Community Theater

As we are sad to see the Leddy Center close its doors, we are excited to announce the start of a new Epping Rec program, the Epping Community Theater (ECT). This group will be run by a board of directors under the authority of the Rec Dept. and will be focused on creating both classes and productions throughout the year.

The mission of the Epping Community Theater is to entertain, enrich, educate, and inspire both the young and the old within our community through the performing arts. With both classes and performances, students of all ages will be provided

a rich learning opportunity in all aspects of theater production and management. ECT is dedicated to both performers and audiences to create valuable community experiences throughout the year.

Children's theater classes will start with a one week summer camp **August 20**th-**24**th, held from 8:30 am to noon each day; to signup go to (http://eppingrecreation.org/youthprograms/). Fall and spring youth classes will be offered throughout the year in musical theater, singing, and various instruments. Our intention is to also offer these classes and more to adults.

Performances planned this year will include an Epping winter tradition, A Christmas Carol, which will be directed by Steve Koch (no stranger to the Leddy productions of the show), as well as Alice in Wonderland in the spring!

Performances and classes will be held at the performing space on Ladds Lane (Where the Leddy Center used to perform). Stephen Kaneb, owner of the property, has renamed the building The Epping Playhouse and has generously offered us a great opportunity to share the space.

We hope to put together a "Launching Party" picnic, at the grounds of Watson Academy **August 18**th (day of the fireworks) and are currently working out the details. There is room for all ages to come out and take part in both performing and production so keep your eyes and ears open for what ECT does next!

Summer has arrived! And with summer we expect to see many visitors. It is the time of year people are traveling and are thrilled to find us open. We are the only small historical society in the area that is open year round. Although we are only open one morning a week, we love to open up for visitors from away. They call, and make an appointment; usually I can meet them the same day.

Already this season we have had a visitor from California. Her mother grew up in Epping and her grandparents are buried in the St. Joseph Cemetery. She was researching the Briand family. Last week we had a visitor from Hooksett who was doing research on her family right here in Epping. Mary was researching the Gagnon family, with roots in Canada. It turns out her brother also lives in Epping now. It really is a small world.

We are working on our building, doing some much needed cleaning and repairs. The back room needs to be cleaned out (again) but we'll wait for cooler weather to tackle that job!

The Leddy Center has generously donated several items to the Society. One item is the beautiful quilt made by Simone Murphy for the celebration of their 25th year. The Leddy Center was an important part of Epping's history. The theatre produced shows for 43 years. Thank you Elaine and Bruce Gatchel!!

We now have an "almost" complete set of Epping High School Yearbooks. The School generously donated the books when I explained that they were going to be sent to Oklahoma to be digitally copied. This is a free service offered to historical societies, libraries and schools. This is the second time we have sent books to them for copying and there is no charge for service or shipping. We are missing several years, so if you have any around just gathering dust, keep us in mind. The missing years are: 1951, 1952, 1958, 1959, 1962, 1966, 1967, 1970 and 1980.

We welcome volunteers; we can always find a project for you to work on. Come join our Monday morning team, everyone has his or her own special expertise to help with archiving. You will be amazed at the amount of material we have at the Society. We love to share our collections with our many visitors and keeping it organized is a great help.

Jenny and Lee Allen have been volunteering for several years. When we received Don Sanborn's collections, there were numerous newspaper clippings. Don had separated them by month and year, but they needed trimming. Don always said "today's news is tomorrow's history" and he saved every piece of news from Epping. Jenny trims all the articles and Lee copies them for a clean copy. The old newspapers are becoming very fragile, and need to be tossed. As we are all interested in history, when Lee comes across an interesting story, he shares the story with all of us. Lee found the following recently, an anonymous editorial. The newspaper was not identified.

Labor of Love

To the editor:

The following story is about one of our native sons.

Tristram Coffin Colcord (Colket)

Tristram Coffin Colcord was born in Epping in 1809. He was the son of Peter and Phebe Colcord. He grew up in Epping, but he left Epping when he was seventeen years old for Portsmouth, NH, and soon married. His wife died a few years later, leaving two children. Tristram remarried in 1839, and just prior to that time, he moved to Philadelphia. Sometime between his first marriage and his second marriage, he changed his name to Coffin Colket. I can understand dropping the first name, but why his surname? This is a mystery-was it because of financial reverses?

He became a very successful business man, starting in the lumber business, but ended up the President of the Germantown, Pennsylvania Railroad. He owned a lot of property, and lived in one of the most beautiful homes in Philadelphia. Before he died he left several hundred dollars for improvements to the Central Cemetery in Epping. His two sisters and his parents ae buried there. He left an immense estate in Philadelphia. He had

several children and his descendents still live in that area.

Not bad for a boy from this small town!

Nature Talks

Walk in the Woods and Paddle the River

Your Conservation Commission has been working on trails! Todd Hathaway is designing 4-5 miles of mountain biking trails at the Folsom Conservation Area (on the west side of town near Joshua Lane), which connects to the Rockingham Rail Trail. We'll be looking for volunteers there once it's all well marked. The work will be with hand tools, such as rakes, shovels and hoes, along with some saw work on downed trees and limbs and some pruning.

Many of you know that Robert Friend Low Park (on Mast Road by the speedway) was harvested last summer and we marked out a trail there, about 1.5 miles. We'll be looking for some volunteers to help get that one in shape once the weather cools off a bit.

Thanks to Trail Steward, Joel Harris, Fox Run trails are in much better shape. He installed one microbridge near the exit and repaired the main bridge at the trail entrance by the kiosk.

The Lamprey River Advisory Committee is working with the Conservation Commission to upgrade the Tilton Bridge Canoe Launch area. Some of you might have noticed last fall that the Town put down a layer of gravel to smooth the parking area around the pavement. Preston Samuel has designed the upgrade to the canoe launch and Kevin Martin will rework the trail markers, and we'll need volunteers to help get that trail up to snuff.

Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee Improving Access to the Lamprey River



The Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee (LRAC) is assisting several towns this summer to improve access areas for paddlers and other visitors.

In Newmarket, the new Schoppmeyer Memorial Park is taking shape. The site is located behind the Newmarket Community Church on Main Street and will feature benches, picnic tables, and carry-in boat access. The town's park advisory committee is also looking into the possibility of including a handicap-accessible kayak launch. The LRAC donated money for the purchase of the site and will help with the design of signage dedicating the park in memory of Chris Schoppmeyer.

In Epping, the canoe landing at the Route 87 bridge crossing is in need of repairs and reconfiguration. This is the finish area for the annual Lamprey River Canoe Race. The Epping Conservation Commission and LRAC are looking at improving the canoe launch, doing trail maintenance on the flood plain educational path, and replacing the tired kiosk panel. The parking area has already been improved with gravel to minimize the drop away from the paved area.

In Epping and Lee, the LRAC is partnering with Trout Unlimited to remove sections of downed trees that block canoe passage. The wood removed will be placed back into the river to provide necessary cover for fish. This work is being supported by a grant from the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation.

Race prizes will be awarded for best time for solo and team and theme parade prizes will be awarded for best-decorated boat or paddlers.

Your well water will be that much healthier than using poisons that DOT, Highway depts and others use.

Epping Fire Department Safety Tips For Epping

Summer is here and it's a great time to enjoy the outdoors. It's also a great time to clean out any clutter or unwanted items. Hoarding is becoming a real problem in the United States for firefighters. Although one man's junk is another man's treasurer, it increases the fire load and challenges firefighters to rescue a person in a timely fashion. Fire grows twice as fast every minute and extra clutter only accelerates it.

Cookouts are a great way to celebrate the summer with family and friends. Make sure you grill away from your house, or garage. Never grill or use a hibachi on a deck. It is against the law to have a grill on a deck in an apartment or multifamily complex. Use approved propane gas tanks and shut them off after the grill cools down.

Chimneys should be cleaned by a licensed and insured contractor. Fireplaces and woodstoves should also be cleaned out as well. Make sure ashes are drowned out and never placed in a box or paper bag. The best place to put your ashes is your garden as it will help neutral the acidity in your soil.

Be careful when using fireworks and make sure that you and your family enjoy them from a distance. Never play with fireworks inside a building or structure and be aware of any local, state and federal laws. Yes, Town of Epping allows people to buy and use fireworks.

Burn permits are required and must be obtained in order to burn brush or have a camp and/or cooking fire. You may get them online or stop by the fire station during the day, 7 days a week - from 6 am to 6 pm.

Burn Permits

Burn Permits are required for **all outside burning**. Permits will be issued at the fire station seven days a week, 6:00 am-6:00 pm. Permits <u>Will</u> **Not** be issued when fire danger is class 3 or above.

At the March 13, 2018 town meeting, the voters allowed the museum committee to use the 1935 fire station at 147 Main Street as a Fire Department and Brickyard Museum. At this time, two of our original pieces of Fire apparatus have been relocated to this building. Our plan is to have a thorough cleaning, replace some of the ceiling panels, then paint the woodwork, the ceiling and the floor. We plan to replace the present doors with glass doors so the equipment can be viewed when the museum is not open. From there we will start building display areas for various fire and rescue equipment and start the history of the Epping Fire Department. The building was built in 1935 with Fire Chief Ralph Goodrich at the controls. It was active until the present Safety Complex was dedicated in 2001 - 56 years of active service.
